


Findings: Worldview

Conclusions

Respondents overall positive

- Non (Protestant, Catholic, or Orthodox) Christians less positive
 - Harder to feel welcome; find a faith-based community; experience greater negative behavior/discrimination

Largest barriers to interfaith engagement are Attitudes

• Religious exclusivism; Christianity; Prejudice; and Politics cited the most

Education and Community Events most desired

• Family friendly activities would draw a younger crowd
